**An Ordinance relating to Evidence.**

[31st August, 1917.]

Enacted by the Governor of the Uganda Protectorate.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Uganda Evidence (Amendment) Ordinance, 1917," and shall be read as one with The Uganda Evidence Ordinance, 1909, (hereinafter referred to as the principal Ordinance). Short title and construction.
2. Section three of the principal Ordinance is hereby amended by adding thereto the following, *viz.* :— Section 3 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1909 amended.
- "Monogamous marriage" means a marriage "which is by law necessarily monogamous and "binding during the lifetime of both parties "unless dissolved by a valid judgment of a "Court." "Monogamous Marriage."
3. Section fifty-two of the principal Ordinance is hereby amended by adding thereto the following words :— Section 52 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1909 amended.
- "Notwithstanding anything in this section "contained a previous conviction for any "offence becomes relevant, after conviction in "the case under trial, for the purpose of "affecting the sentence to be awarded by the "Court." Relevancy of previous convictions.
4. Sections one hundred and nineteen to one hundred and twenty-three (both inclusive) of the principal Ordinance are hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor, *viz.* :— Sections 119 to 123 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1909 repealed and other provisions substituted.
- "119 (1) Every person charged with an offence "shall be a competent witness, and the wife or husband, "as the case may be, of the person so charged shall be "a competent but not compellable witness, for the "defence at every stage of the proceedings, whether the "person so charged is charged solely or jointly with any "other person. "Competency "of person "charged and "husband or "wife of person "charged to "give "evidence."
- "Provided as follows :—
- "(a) A person so charged shall not be called as "a witness in pursuance of this section "except upon his own application ;

- “(b) The failure of any person charged with  
 “an offence, or of the wife or husband,  
 “as the case may be, of the person so  
 “charged, to give evidence shall not be  
 “made the subject of any comment by  
 “the prosecution ;
- “(c) The wife or husband of the person charged  
 “shall not be called as a witness under  
 “this section, except upon the application  
 “of the person so charged.
- “(d) Every person called as a witness in  
 “pursuance of this section shall, unless  
 “otherwise ordered by the Court, give  
 “his evidence from the witness box or  
 “other place from which the other  
 “witnesses give their evidence.
- “(e) Nothing in this section shall affect the  
 “right of the person charged to make  
 “a statement without being sworn, or  
 “the provisions of section 342 of the  
 “Indian Code of Criminal Procedure as  
 “applied to the Protectorate, when the  
 “person charged is not called as a  
 “witness.

“(2) In this section “Husband” and “Wife”  
 “mean a husband and wife of a monogamous marriage.

“120. (1) Where the only witness to the facts of  
 “the case called by the defence is the person charged,  
 “he shall be called as a witness before any other witness  
 “for the defence.

“(2) In cases where the right of reply depends upon  
 “the question whether evidence has been called for the  
 “defence, the fact that the person charged has been  
 “called as a witness shall not of itself confer on the  
 “prosecution the right of reply.

“121. (1) The wife or husband of a person charged,  
 “with an offence against the person of such wife  
 “or husband, or, on the complaint of such wife or  
 “husband, with an offence against the property of such

 “section 121, 121A, 122, 123, 354, 366, 372, 373, or 376  
 “of the Indian Penal Code as applied to the Protectorate,  
 “or with an attempt to commit or with abetment of any  
 “such offence aforesaid, or with an offence punishable  
 “under section 494 or 495 of the Indian Penal Code as  
 “applied to the Protectorate or under section 43, 51 or  
 “52 of the Uganda Marriage Ordinance, 1902, shall be  
 “a competent but not compellable witness either for the  
 “prosecution or defence and may be called without the  
 “consent of the person charged.

“(2) Nothing in this Ordinance shall—

- “(a) affect the provisions relating to the calling,  
 “competency or compellability of a wife or  
 “husband to give evidence contained in any  
 “enactment for the time being in force in the  
 “Protectorate ;

“(b) make a husband compellable to disclose any  
 “communication made to him by his wife  
 “during the marriage or a wife compellable to  
 “disclose any communication made to her by  
 “her husband during the marriage.

“(3) In this section “Husband” and “Wife” mean  
 “husband and wife of a monogamous marriage.

“122. Where a person charged with an offence is  
 “married to another person by a marriage other than  
 “a monogamous marriage such last-named person shall  
 “be a competent and compellable witness on behalf  
 “either of the prosecution or of the defence.

“123. (1) Except as provided by sections 119,  
 “121 and 122 the wife or husband of a person charged  
 “with an offence either solely or jointly with some other

**An Ordinance relating to Branding of Stock.**

[1ST JANUARY, 1918.]

Enacted by the Governor of the Uganda Protectorate.

1. This Ordinance, may be cited as "The Short title and commencement. Branding of Stock Ordinance, 1917," and shall come into force on the first day of January, 1918.

2. In this Ordinance, unless inconsistent with the Interpretation. context,

"Brand" means a brand duly registered under this Ordinance and made upon any portion of the hide of any stock in manner prescribed.

"Branding Directory" means an authorised list of brands compiled by the Registrar of Brands and published by the Government;

"Branding iron" means the instrument prescribed for imprinting a brand or mark on stock;

"Branding instrument" means any other instrument or tool by which any mark or symbol can be impressed, imprinted or cut on any portion of any stock;

"Cattle" means any bull, cow, steer, heifer or calf;

"Distinctive Mark" means a lawful mark (other than a registered brand) which a native is empowered by this Ordinance to mark upon any stock;

"District Commissioner" includes Assistant District Commissioner;

"Holding" means any farm or other place where stock is kept;

"Horse" means any horse, mare, gelding, colt filly, ass, zebra or mule;

"Inspector" means any person empowered to act as an Inspector of Brands under this Ordinance;

"Native" means native of Africa not being of European or Asiatic race or origin;

"Register" means the register book kept in pursuance of this Ordinance containing a list of brands for stock registered hereunder;

"Registrar" means the Registrar of Brands;

"Residence" means the residence, house, home-stead or dwelling of the owner of any brand or stock;

"Stock" means horses, cattle and ostriches.

Registrar and  
Inspectors of  
Brands.

3. The Governor may appoint an Officer in the Department of Agriculture to be Registrar of Brands and such persons as he may think fit from time to time to be Inspectors of Brands. Every Provincial Commissioner, District Commissioner and European Police Officer shall be *ex-officio* an Inspector of Brands.

Register Book.

4. The Registrar shall keep a register in the form given in the first Schedule of all brands allotted under the provisions of this Ordinance.

Application for  
brand.

5. Any person requiring a brand shall deliver or transmit to the Registrar an application in the form given in the second Schedule accompanied by a fee of five Rupees for the registration of a brand; if no special combination is applied for, the Registrar, if satisfied that such application is in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance, shall allot to such applicant in the order in which his application is received the first unallotted brand standing in the Register for the district in which the holding is situated on which the brand is to be used and shall register the said brand to such applicant accordingly in the form given in the first Schedule.

Provided always that it shall be lawful for the Registrar at the request of the owner as aforesaid to allot another combination standing vacant in the register for the same district: Provided further that it shall not be necessary for a person who owns or occupies land in more than one district to register a separate brand in respect of each district. Such person may select any one of the districts in which he intends to use such brand and may use the brand registered in respect of that district in any other district in which he shall keep stock.

Certificate.

6. Upon the registration of any brand as aforesaid the Registrar shall deliver or transmit to the applicant to whom such brand is allotted a certificate of the registration thereof in the form given in the third Schedule.

Form of regis-  
tered brand.

7. Save as otherwise provided by this Ordinance every registered brand shall consist of two letters and one numeral of plain and uniform pattern in an even and regular line, and the first of the letters shall indicate the district in which the holding is situated on which the brand is to be used.

Number of  
brands limited.

8. One brand and no more shall be allotted to any person in any one district.

Size of brands.

9. The size of the characters branded on horses, cattle and ostriches shall not be less than one and a quarter inches in height.

Imprinting  
of brands.

10. All brands shall be imprinted on stock as follows:—

(a) (1.) In the case of cattle and horses—

The first brand shall be imprinted on the near side of the neck or near rump of the animal, and every second and subsequent brand shall, where there is sufficient space for the purpose, be imprinted on the same



part of the animal, and where there is not sufficient space for the purpose, then such second or subsequent brand shall be imprinted on the part of the animal next in order according to the following tables, each part being used until there is not sufficient space for any further brand on that part:—

When the first brand is on the near side of the neck.	When the first brand is on the near rump.
1. Off side of neck.	1. Off rump.
2. Near rump.	2. Near side of neck.
3. Off rump.	3. Off side of neck.
4. Near shoulder.	4. Near shoulder.
5. Off shoulder.	5. Off shoulder.

(2.) In the case of ostriches—

The first brand shall be imprinted on the near thigh, and every second or subsequent brand shall, where there is sufficient space for the purpose, be imprinted on the same part, and, where there is not sufficient space for the purpose, then such second or subsequent brand shall be imprinted on the off thigh.

- (b) Every brand on the same part of an animal or ostrich as a previous brand shall be at a distance of not less than one and a half inches from and directly underneath the previous brand.

11. The Registrar shall at the end of each quarter of every year or as soon thereafter as possible cause to be published in the *Gazette* a statement in the form given in the first Schedule of all brands registered under this Ordinance during such quarter with the name and addresses of their respective owners.

Publication of registered brands.

12. From such quarterly publications the Registrar, as soon as possible after the 31st December in each year, shall cause a Brand Directory containing all the brands which stand registered up to that date to be compiled and published in the form of the said publications; and he shall cause a copy thereof to be forwarded as soon as possible after publication to the Commissioner of Police, every Inspector of Brands and Poundmaster.

Animal Brand Directory.

13. The person wishing to transfer his right to any registered brand and the person intending to become the transferee thereof shall sign a document in the form given in the fourth Schedule and shall transmit it to the Registrar with a fee of ten Rupees and the Registrar may on receipt thereof cancel the registration of the said brand standing in the name of the transferor and register such brand in the name of the transferee, and such transferee shall thereafter be deemed to be the person having the exclusive right to use such brand as aforesaid; the Registrar may return the fees and decline to register the transfer; provided that on the sale of a holding if the owner does not sell the whole of the

Transfer of registered brands.

stock bearing his brand to the purchaser the Registrar shall not transfer the brand to the purchaser of such holding.

Transfer book.

14. The Registrar shall keep a book in which all transfers, surrenders and cancellations of brands shall be recorded, and the Registrar shall notify the same at the end of every quarter in the *Gazette* immediately following the quarterly statement of brands registered.

Certificate of transfer.

15. Upon the transfer of any brand as aforesaid the Registrar shall deliver or transmit to the transferee a certificate of transfer in the form given in the fifth Schedule.

Surrender of brands.

16. The owner of any brand may surrender the same and the Registrar shall on receipt of notice thereof cancel the registration.

Disused brands.

17. When it appears to the Registrar upon the report of an Inspector or otherwise that a registered brand is not in use he may cause notice to be given to the owner thereof calling upon him to show cause why the same should not be cancelled; and if cause is not shown to the satisfaction of the Registrar within six months after such notice he may cancel the brand.

Interval before reallocation.

18. No brand which has been surrendered or cancelled shall be reallocated until a period of five years from such surrender or cancellation has elapsed.

The Registrar to register a brand for every public pound.

19. The Registrar shall allot a brand to every public pound already or hereafter established and shall register the same. The first character of every such brand shall be a diamond and the second the dominant letter of the district and third a numeral, the whole to be in one line, and the Poundmaster or other person in charge of a pound shall on the sale of any stock impounded therein brand the same with such brand, and any Poundmaster or other person in charge of a pound who shall fail to comply with the provisions of this section shall be liable to a fine not exceeding seven hundred and fifty Rupees and in default of payment to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding six months.

The Poundmaster must brand all stock sold out of pound.

Brands of the Veterinary Department to be registered.

20. The Chief Veterinary Officer may register any one or more brands to be used for the purposes of the Veterinary Department on any stock. Such brands may be of any device, provided they are easily distinguishable from any other brand registered under this Ordinance, and may be lawfully used for the purposes of the Veterinary Department on any stock by any person or persons authorized by the Chief Veterinary Officer.

Natives may use distinctive marks to identify the ownership of stock provided that such marks are unlike any registered brand.

21. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to make it an offence for a native to mark any stock of which he is the owner with a distinctive mark to identify the ownership of such stock, provided that neither letters nor figures form any part of such distinctive mark and that such mark is dissimilar to any registered brand.

22. It shall be lawful for the Registrar to prohibit the use by any native of a distinctive mark which in his opinion is similar to any registered brand; and any native who shall mark any stock with a distinctive mark so prohibited shall be liable to a fine not exceeding seven hundred and fifty Rupees or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to both and his stock so marked may by the order of the Court be confiscated.

The Registrar may prohibit the use of certain distinctive marks.

23. (1) The dominant letter of a brand registered in any district shall be that prescribed in the sixth Schedule. Provided however that the Governor may by Proclamation in the *Gazette* prescribe that some mark or design other than a letter shall be used to signify any district.

The dominant letters of districts to be applied to the brands registered therein.

(2) The Governor may by Proclamation add any district to the said Schedule and may prescribe the dominant letter or mark to be applied to brands registered in such district, or may remove any district from the said Schedule.

24. Every butcher, Poundmaster and auctioneer shall keep a separate book open at all times to inspection by any Inspector and shall therein truly enter the brands cut or imprinted on all stock slaughtered or sold by him.

Butchers' and dealers' books.

25. Any butcher, Poundmaster or auctioneer who shall slaughter or sell any stock on whose hide or skin any brand imprinted under the provisions of this Ordinance shall appear to have been altered, blotched or defaced, without first reporting the matter in writing to the nearest Inspector and allowing 48 hours to elapse after making such report shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine not exceeding seventy-five Rupees per head for every animal so unlawfully slaughtered or sold, or to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding three months or to both.

Stock with defaced brand not to be sold or slaughtered without notice.

26. (1) Any person who shall slaughter or cause to be slaughtered any stock for sale shall retain or cause to be retained in his possession the hides or skins taken off such stock with the brands or ear marks attached thereto without any alteration, disfiguration or effacement of the brands or marks on such hides, skins or ears for the period of five days.

Preservation of hides.

(2) Any Inspector may within the period of time mentioned in the last preceding section demand an inspection of such hides, and upon demand being made the aforesaid person shall produce the same for inspection by the said Inspector.

(3) Any person contravening any of the provisions of this section shall be liable to a fine not exceeding three hundred and seventy-five Rupees or to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding three months or to both.

27. Every Inspector is hereby empowered to enter on or into any part of any holding or place throughout the Protectorate where stock is kept or slaughtered and to inspect any stock, hides, branding irons, branding instruments or brand and compare the same with the brand certificate and diagram which shall be produced to him; and every Inspector

Inspector may enter any holding or place where stock is kept or slaughtered.

may seize any stock and any hides in respect of which any breach of this Ordinance has been or is suspected to have been committed and any branding iron or branding instrument and any brand certificate and may take them before the nearest Magistrate. Any person hindering or impeding any Inspector in the execution of his duty or attempting so to do or refusing to produce any branding iron, branding instrument or brand certificate or to permit any Inspector to inspect any stock or hides shall for every such offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand Rupees or to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding six months or to both.

Inspectors to keep copy of Brands and permit search in Directory.

28. Every Inspector (other than a Police Officer) shall keep a copy of the latest issue of the Brands Directory and a copy of every *Gazette* containing the quarterly statement of registered brands not included in such Directory and shall on receipt of a fee of one Rupee permit search therein at all reasonable hours.

Notice, how given.

29. Where under the provisions of this Ordinance it may be necessary to give or send any notice the same may be given in any of the following ways:—

- (1) personally upon the person to whom the notice is addressed;
- (2) by registered letter sent through the post and directed to the last known place of abode or business in the Protectorate of such person;
- (3) by inserting the notice once in the *Gazette*.

Sale of branding instruments.

30. Any person who shall make or offer for sale any branding instrument or tool adapted for the purpose of imprinting marks on stock except in accordance with this Ordinance and the rules thereunder and similar to or resembling in pattern and size those prescribed and any person who shall use or attempt to use or knowingly permit to be used or have in his possession any branding iron or branding instrument similar to or resembling in pattern and size those prescribed other than the branding iron which he is entitled to use as herein provided shall be guilty of an offence and liable for every such offence to a fine not exceeding one thousand Rupees and in default of payment to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding six months.

Fraudulently branding the stock of others.

31. If any person shall wilfully brand or imprint with his distinctive mark any stock of which he is not the owner or shall wilfully cause, direct or permit any stock of which he is not the owner to be branded with his brand, such person shall for every such offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand and five hundred Rupees or to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding twelve months or to both.

Using unregistered brands and irregularly using registered brands.

32. Any person other than a native who shall brand or direct, aid or assist in branding on any stock or any portion thereof any signs, symbols or characters other than those made and registered in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance shall for every

such offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand Rupees and in default of payment to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding six months or to both.

33. Any person who shall wilfully blotch, deface or otherwise render illegible or alter any brand or distinctive mark upon stock or wilfully direct, cause or permit any such brand or mark to be blotched, defaced or otherwise rendered illegible or altered or be a party thereto shall for every such offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand Rupees or to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding six months or to both.

Defacing  
brands.

34. Any person who:—

- (a) shall knowingly and unlawfully insert or permit to be inserted any false entry or diagram of any matter relating to any brand in any register, certificate, brands directory or quarterly statement, or in any extract from any of them; or
- (b) shall with intent to defraud, forge, alter, offer, utter, dispose of or put off knowing the same to be forged or altered any such document or extract as aforesaid or which purports to be such; or
- (c) shall with intent to defraud wilfully and unlawfully destroy, deface or alter or cause to be destroyed, defaced or altered any such document or extract therefrom; or
- (d) shall knowingly and wilfully with intent to defraud use the brand or distinctive mark of any proprietor without his authority

shall for every such offence be liable to a fine not exceeding five thousand Rupees or to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding three years or to both.

35. On the trial of any person for the theft of any hide or stock or for receiving or retaining any hide or stock knowing or having reason to believe the same to have been stolen, the fact that such hide or stock is branded with a registered brand shall be *prima facie* evidence that such hide or stock is the property of the person having the right to such registered brand.

36. In any proceedings, a person's right to any registered brand may be proved by a certificate purporting to be under the hand of the Registrar or by production of a copy of the *Gazette* containing the statement of the registration of such brand.

37. On the trial of any person for the theft of any hide or stock or for receiving or retaining any hide or stock knowing or having reason to believe the same to have been stolen the fact that such hide or stock has been mutilated by such person in such a way that any brand or distinctive mark is removed or rendered illegible shall be *prima facie* evidence that such person is not the owner or person entitled to the possession of such hide or stock.

38. Any person wilfully failing to comply with or offending against the provisions of this Ordinance in any case in which no penalty is imposed hereby; and any person failing to comply with or offending against any of the provisions of any rule under this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine not exceeding three hundred Rupees and in default of payment to imprisonment of either description for any term not exceeding two months.

Governor may make rules.

39. The Governor may make rules for carrying out the purposes and provisions of this Ordinance and amongst other matters may prescribe:—

- (1) the shape and pattern of branding irons and other marking instruments;
- (2) the persons by whom branding irons and branding instruments may be manufactured and sold;
- (3) the fees and prices payable and forms to be used for any object or purpose that may be deemed necessary for the efficient administration of this Ordinance.

**An Ordinance relating to Gold and Silver Coins.**

[31<sup>ST</sup> AUGUST, 1917.]

Enacted by the Governor of the Uganda Protectorate.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Coinage Ordinance, 1917."

2. No person shall melt down, break up, or use otherwise than as currency any gold or silver coin which is for the time being current in the United Kingdom or in any British Possession or Protectorate.

Prohibition on using gold and silver coins except as currency.

3. Any person committing a breach of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an offence punishable with imprisonment of either kind not exceeding six months or with a fine not exceeding one thousand five hundred Rupees or with both.

Penalty.

4. Every offence under this Ordinance shall be a cognizable offence within the meaning of the Indian Code of Criminal Procedure as applied to the Protectorate.

**RULES.**

THE UGANDA OUTLYING DISTRICTS (WEST NILE)  
RULES, 1917.

1. THESE RULES may be cited as "The Uganda Outlying Districts (West Nile) Rules, 1917," and shall apply to the West Nile District.

2. In these Rules "District Commissioner" includes Assistant District Commissioner in charge of a District.

3. Licences to enter the said District may be issued by the Provincial Commissioner of the Northern Province or by the District Commissioner at Arua.

4. Persons desiring to obtain a licence shall apply for the same at the office of the Provincial Commissioner at Masindi if coming from any part of the Uganda Protectorate or to the District Commissioner at Arua if entering the District from the Sudan or Belgian Congo without passing through Uganda. Application to the District Commissioner at Arua may be made by letter or by the applicant in person in which case he shall proceed to Arua by a main route and as expeditiously as circumstances will permit. Save as aforesaid the applicant shall not enter the District prior to the issue of the licence.

5. Prior to the issue of a licence the applicant may be required to deposit with the Provincial Commissioner or District Commissioner such sum, not exceeding Rs. 500, or to furnish such security as the Provincial Commissioner or District Commissioner may deem necessary as surety for the good behaviour in the District of the licensee and for the due observance of the conditions subject to which the licence is issued.

6. Every licence shall be deemed to be issued subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) It shall expire twelve months after the date of issue or at such other time as may be specially specified therein.
- (2) It may be cancelled at any time by the Provincial Commissioner or by any District Commissioner.
- (3) It shall be produced for inspection when required by any Administrative Officer or Police Officer.
- (4) It shall comprise particulars of the firearms which the licensee is carrying by himself or his servants and no person shall bring into the District any firearms not so comprised.
- (5) Nothing therein shall be deemed to authorize a breach of any Sleeping Sickness Ordinance or Rules for the time being in force.
- (6) Any other special conditions endorsed thereon at the time of issue by the Provincial Commissioner or District Commissioner issuing the same or subsequently by the Provincial Commissioner or by any District Commissioner.

7. Every licence shall be in the form given in the Schedule hereto or to that effect and the above-mentioned conditions shall be endorsed thereon.

8. The Uganda Outlying Districts (Northern Province) Rules, 1913 and 1914, are hereby repealed but without prejudice always to anything lawfully done thereunder, or to the privileges given by licences issued thereunder and remaining in force.

## THE KINGDOM OF BUGANDA.

### A LAW TO PREVENT DRUNKENNESS.

ENACTED BY HIS HIGHNESS THE KABAKA BY AND WITH THE ADVICE OF THE LUKIKO AND WITH THE APPROVAL OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE ACTING GOVERNOR.

1. This Law may be called "The Native Liquor Law, 1917," and shall come into force on the 31st day of August, 1917.

2. This Law applies to all parts of the Kingdom of Buganda excepting such Government Stations as may be subject to the Liquor Ordinance, 1916, and the rules issued thereunder from time to time by the Governor.

3. The word "Liquor" means any intoxicating drink prepared in accordance with native custom and includes Mwenge (Pombe), Kangara, Muna, Marissa, Marawa, and Nule. "Sale" and "Sell" includes barter.

4. There shall be no more licensed houses for the sale of liquor ("Birabo") but any native may make liquor in reasonable quantities for the use of himself, his family and friends and for sale but subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) It is absolutely forbidden to make or sell liquor in the Kibuga.
- (b) No person shall bring any liquor into the Kibuga without first obtaining a permit from the Lukiko in the form given in the Schedule hereto. This permit must be carried by the persons bringing the liquor and produced on demand.
- (c) No liquor may be sold in any public market nor on any high road.

(d) If any person buys liquor he shall not drink it on the high road nor at the place where he bought it.

(e) Any breach of these conditions shall be an offence.

(5+g) Any person found drunk and incapable or disorderly in any road or public place and any person becoming noisy or quarrelsome or abusive through drunkenness as well as the owner of the premises on which such person obtained too much drink shall be guilty of offences.

6. No person shall make, drink, or sell Waragi or any strong spirit.

40 7. The fee payable for a permit to bring liquor into the Kibuga shall be ~~2~~ cents per calabash for a regular supply and ~~10~~ cents per calabash for an occasional supply.

Persons guilty of offences or breaches of this Law shall be punished with a fine not exceeding Rs. ~~2~~ with or without imprisonment up to 1 month for a first offence, with fine not exceeding Rs. ~~2~~ with or without imprisonment up to 2 months for a second offence and with a fine not exceeding Rs. ~~2~~ with or without imprisonment up to 6 months for subsequent offences.

9. In addition to any punishment the Court may order that the accused shall not make or buy any liquor until a further order shall give him permission to do so. A breach of any such order shall be an offence.

10. Upon a conviction for any offence under this Law the Court may seize any liquor or vessels for containing the same or materials and plant used for making the same which may be found on the premises of the accused and may order the destruction or other disposal thereof in such manner as they may think fit.
