An Ordinance relating to Trading with the Enemy.

[15TH MARCH, 1917.]

Enacted by the Governor of the Uganda Protectorate.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Trading with the Enemy (Amendment) Ordinance, 1917," and shall be read as one with the Trading with the Enemy Ordinance, 1914, the Trading with the Enemy (Amendment) Ordinance, 1915, the Trading with the Enemy (Amendment No. 2) Ordinance, 1915, and the Trading with the Enemy (Amendment) Ordinance, 1916, and this Ordinance and the said Ordinances may be cited together as "The Trading with the Enemy Ordinances, 1914 to 1917." Short title and construction.

2. In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires:— Interpretation.

"Property" includes documents of title to property.

"Enemy territory" means the territory of any State at war with His Majesty the King (including the Colonies and Dependencies thereof) except such parts thereof as are in British or Allied occupation.

"Enemy person" includes all persons, firms, companies and corporations, residing or carrying on business in enemy territory.

"Enemy Government" means the Government of any State at war with His Majesty the King.

3. Any British subject who is entitled to property of any description whatsoever in enemy territory or to any interest in such property or has any claim against any enemy person or enemy Government shall within thirty days after the commencement of this Ordinance make a return of his said property or claim to the Custodian in such form and with such particulars as the Custodian may require, and if any person fails to do so he shall, on conviction, be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 1,500 or to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding six months, or to both, and, in addition, to a further fine not exceeding Rs. 750 for every day during which the default continues; provided that it shall not be necessary to make any such return respecting any property or claim, whereof returns have before the commencement of this Ordinance been voluntarily made to the Custodian in the form prescribed by him. British subjects having claims against enemy persons or Governments or to property in enemy territory to notify Custodian.

An Ordinance relating to Trading with the Enemy.

[15TH MARCH, 1917.]

Enacted by the Governor of the Uganda Protectorate.

Short title and construction.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Trading with the Enemy (Disposal of Property) Ordinance, 1917," and shall be read as one with The Trading with the Enemy Ordinances, 1914 to 1917.

Interpretation.

2. In this Ordinance, unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires,

"Immoveable property" includes any right, whether legal or equitable, in or arising out of immoveable property.

"Corporation under enemy control" includes

- (a) A corporation of which any of the directors or persons occupying the position of directors by whatever name called is an enemy or enemy subject.
- (b) A corporation shareholders in which holding ten per cent or more of the issued capital or voting rights of the corporation are enemies or enemy subjects or persons who hold such shares or stock directly or indirectly for or at the disposal of enemies or enemy subjects.
- (c) A corporation which is by any other means whether of a like or a different character in fact under the control directly or indirectly of enemies or enemy subjects or corporations under enemy control.
- (d) A corporation the executive whereof is a corporation within (a) (b) and (c) above.

"Enemy" means any person who is or is treated as an enemy under any Act of Parliament, Order in or of Council or Royal Proclamation for the time being in force.

"Enemy subject" means a subject of a State for the time being at war with His Majesty.

Custodian not to sell property to an enemy, enemy subject or a corporation under enemy control.

3. The Custodian shall not sell any immoveable property to an enemy or enemy subject or a corporation under enemy control or to any person acting for an enemy or enemy subject or corporation under enemy control and further shall not complete any sale of immoveable property unless and until the purchaser being

an individual or corporation shall have made an affidavit in the appropriate form set out in the Schedule. Such affidavit in the case of a corporation being a purchaser shall be made by some official of the corporation duly authorized in that behalf by the corporation.

4. No person in whom any immoveable property sold by the Custodian or any part thereof or any right, title or interest therein shall have become or shall become vested shall except with the authority of the Governor given with the consent of the Secretary of State in any particular case or in general and in the latter case by proclamation or otherwise sell, transfer, lease, mortgage, devise or bequeath such property or any part thereof or any right, title or interest therein to or in any way deal therewith so that the same shall be acquired or owned by or for or be held on behalf of or in trust for or for the benefit of or so as in any way to come under the control of (1) an enemy or enemy subject or corporation under enemy control or (2) any person who but for the conclusion of any peace made in relation to the present war would be an enemy or enemy subject or corporation under enemy control and in either case either alone or jointly with another or others; and if any person contravenes the provisions of this section such person or in the case of a deceased person his estate shall forfeit to His Majesty a sum of seventy-five thousand rupees to be recovered at the suit of the Attorney-General.

5. If any enemy or an enemy subject or a corporation under enemy control purchases from the Custodian any immoveable property contrary to the provisions of section three or if any person in whom any immoveable property sold by the Custodian or any part thereof or any right, title or interest therein shall have become or shall become vested shall become either (1) an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control or (2) a person who but for the conclusion of any peace made in relation to the present war would be an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control or if any transfer, lease, mortgage, devise or bequest of or other dealing with such immoveable property takes place in contravention of the provisions of section four then, and in the latter case without prejudice to the recovery of the penalty under section four, the Attorney-General may apply to the High Court for a declaration that (a) any right, title and interest acquired or purported to be acquired in contravention of the provisions of either of the said sections or held by any person who has become (1) an enemy, enemy subject or a corporation under enemy control or (2) a person who but for the conclusion of any peace made in relation to the present war would be an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control and (b) in the case of a contravention of section four any right, title or interest in the property concerned which may be vested in the person guilty of such contravention is forfeited to the Crown and the Court subject to the proviso following shall forfeit such right, title or interest to the Crown accordingly, provided always that in dealing with the application the Court may take into consideration the position of persons who not being themselves prohibited persons under section

four have *bonâ fide* for value and without actual notice of or knowledge of the circumstances occasioning the liability to such forfeiture acquired any such right, title or interest in such immoveable property or who have acquired any right, title or interest in such immoveable property under the will or otherwise through or under any such persons and may make such order as it thinks fit wholly or partially relieving any such persons from forfeiture of such right, title and interest so acquired by them or otherwise may make such order as it may in the circumstances deem equitable.

Forfeiture of interest vested in enemy, etc., by intestacy.

6. If under the intestacy of any person in whom any immoveable property sold by the Custodian or any part thereof or any right, title or interest therein shall have become or shall become vested any person being a prohibited person under section four acquires any right, title or interest in such immoveable property such right, title or interest shall also be subject to forfeiture under the provisions of section five and the Court shall have the like powers of relieving against forfeiture as are in the said section mentioned.

Power to Governor to require any owner, etc., of property to furnish particulars as to nationality, etc.

7. (1) The Governor may at any time require any person claiming to be the owner, lessee or mortgagee of any immoveable property sold by the Custodian or of any part thereof or of any right, title or interest therein to furnish him in writing with such particulars as appear to the Governor to be necessary to enable him to ascertain whether or not the person is or holds the property or any part thereof or any right, title or interest therein for or on behalf of or in trust for or for the benefit of or in any way so as to come under the control of an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control or of a person who but for the conclusion of any peace made in relation to the present war would be an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control and in the case of a corporation may also require any director of the corporation or person occupying the position of director by whatever name called or the secretary or any other officer of the corporation performing the duties of secretary or any person acting as manager or agent for the corporation in connection with the property to furnish the required particulars.

(2) If any person fails when required to furnish such particulars as it is in his power to give or ascertain or furnishes particulars which are false in any material particular he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one thousand five hundred rupees or to imprisonment of either description for a period not exceeding six months or to both.

(3) Where any particulars have been furnished in accordance with this section such particulars may be used in evidence against the person or corporation by whom they are furnished in any proceedings under sections four or five and the fact that any person who has been required to furnish particulars in accordance with this section refuses or neglects to furnish such particulars as it is in his power to give or ascertain or furnishes particulars which are false in any material particular shall be *primâ facie* evidence in the case of

proceedings under sections four or five that the person regarding whom the particulars were required is an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control or a person who but for the conclusion of any peace made in relation to the present war would be an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control.

An Ordinance relating to the King's African Rifles.

[15TH MARCH, 1917.]

Enacted by the Governor of the Uganda Protectorate.

Short title and
construction.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The King's African Rifles (Amendment) Ordinance, 1917," and shall be read as one with The King's African Rifles Ordinance, 1911, (hereinafter referred to as the principal Ordinance) and The King's African Rifles (Amendment) Ordinance, 1912.

Section 40 of
Ordinance No.
9 of 1911
amended.

2. Section forty of the principal Ordinance is hereby amended by deleting sub-section (1) thereof and substituting therefor the following, *viz.* :—

- "(1) Where he deals with the case summarily,
" he may
- "(A) Save in the case of absence without leave or
" drunkenness, if the offender is a soldier,
" impose on the offender any one or more of
" the following punishments :—
- "(a) Award to the offender imprisonment, with or
" without hard labour, for any period not
" exceeding forty-two days.
- "(b) Reprimand, severely reprimand, or reduce any
" non-commissioned officer to a lower rank or
" to the rank of a private.
- "(c) Award corporal punishment not exceeding
" twenty-four lashes. The Governor shall by
" regulation prescribe the instrument with
" which such punishment shall be inflicted.
- "(d) Dismiss the offender from the regiment.
- "(e) Impose a fine not exceeding twenty-one days'
" pay, to be levied by stoppages from the
" offender's pay.
- "(f) Order the offender to suffer any deduction
" from his ordinary pay to make good the
" amount of any loss or damage he may have
" caused.
- "(g) Order confinement to barracks for any
" period not exceeding twenty-eight days, such
" confinement involving the taking of all duties
" in regular turn, attending parades and
" punishment drills, not exceeding one hour at
" a time nor four hours in all on the same day,
" inclusive of ordinary parades, and also
" liability to employment on duties of fatigue.

- “(h) Order extra guards and piquets, but only for
 “minor offences or irregularities when on or
 “parading for guard or piquet.
 “(B) In the case of any offence under this
 “Ordinance, if the offender is a follower:—
 “(a) Award to the offender any one or more of the
 “punishments described in sub-sections (a) (c)
 “and (d) respectively of Section 40 (1) (A)
 “of this Ordinance.
 “(b) In addition to or without any other punish-
 “ment, impose a fine not exceeding rupees ten.”

PROCLAMATION.

NATIVE COURTS IN BUNYORO.

IN EXERCISE of the powers vested in me by The Courts Ordinance, 1911, I hereby declare and proclaim that the Native Court of the Musale of the Saza in the County of Bujenje in Bunyoro is hereby abolished and that the following Native Courts are established in the said County in lieu of the Courts set forth in the Schedule to the Proclamation of the 24th May, 1913, which is hereby amended accordingly.

IN THE COUNTY OF BUJENJE.

1. The Court of the Saza Chief Kago, situated on the Mugongo, Bujenje.
2. The Court of the Mumyuka of the Saza, situated on the Mugongo, Kiliandongo.
3. The Court of the Sabadu of the Saza, situated on the Mugongo, Biso.
4. The Court of the Sabagabo of the Saza, situated on the Mugongo, Kingo.
5. The Court of the Sabawali of the Saza, situated on the Mugongo, Bulima.
6. The Court of the Mutuba I. of the Saza, situated on the Mugongo, Kyabigambire.
7. The Court of the Mutuba II. of the Saza, situated on the Mugongo, Kyebagira.

This Proclamation shall have effect as from the 1st April, 1917.

THE FORESTS ORDINANCE, 1913,

AND

THE FORESTS (AMENDMENT) ORDINANCE, 1916.

RULES AND NOTICE.

THE FORESTS RULES, 1917.

1. THESE RULES may be cited as “The Forests Rules, 1917.”
2. I hereby prescribe the fees set out in the Schedule as the fees payable for the cutting, taking and removal of forest produce in lieu of those prescribed by the Notice under the Forests Ordinance, 1913, dated the 28th March, 1916, which is hereby superseded; provided that no fee shall be payable for the cutting, taking and removal of forest produce by the Public Works Department or other Government Department specially authorized by the Governor in that behalf.
3. Fees payable for the cutting, taking and removal of forest produce or of produce to which section two of The Forests (Amendment) Ordinance, 1916, applies shall be payable at the time the licence in that behalf is issued.

4. Travellers cutting firewood required for their personal use shall not cut the same from any plantation in a forest or on Crown Land, save under a licence issued under the said above-mentioned Ordinances.

5. It shall be deemed to be a condition of the issue of all licences under the said Ordinances that the directions and restrictions prescribed in the Schedule are observed by the licensee.

6. The Schedule shall apply from the date of publication of these Rules and Notice in the *Gazette* and so far as possible shall apply to all licences issued on or after the 1st April, 1916, and any person who has paid a higher fee under the Notice dated the 28th March, 1916, than would be payable under these Rules and Notice may be paid a refund of the difference, so far as the same can be ascertained, upon application to the authority who issued the licence on or before the 30th September, 1917; provided that where the fee under these Rules and Notice would be higher than the fee paid under the said Notice dated the 28th March, 1916, the licensee shall not be liable to pay such higher fee.

7. The Forests Rules, 1916, are hereby cancelled, but without prejudice always to anything lawfully done thereunder or to the prosecution of any offence committed before the publication of these Rules.

ORDINANCE, 1904.

NOTICE.

THE TRADING WITH THE ENEMY (AMENDMENT) ORDINANCE, 1917.

NOTICE.

1. IN NOTICE dated 14th June, 1916, voluntary returns were asked for as to:—

- (a) Property in enemy or enemy-occupied territory belonging to British subjects in Uganda;
- (b) Debts due to British subjects in Uganda from persons in enemy or enemy-occupied territory;

and it was further notified that claims against enemy Governments (as distinguished from claims against enemy individuals) should be notified to the Director of Foreign Claims, The Foreign Office, Whitehall, London, S.W.

2. The Trading with the Enemy (Amendment) Ordinance, 1917, makes returns to the Custodian of Enemy Property of both these kinds obligatory so far as relates to property and debts in enemy territory and it is an offence not to furnish them within thirty days, but it may be noted that:—

- (a) It is only British subjects who have to furnish these: *e.g.*, Goans need not make returns.
- (b) Returns should not be made where the territory, originally enemy, is now in British or allied occupation, *e.g.*, conquered territory in German East Africa.
- (c) Returns should not be made in cases where a voluntary return has already been made pursuant to the Notice above referred to.
- (d) Returns against enemy Governments are also to be made.

3. The claims against enemies fall into two principal classes (*i*) claims against enemy Governments (*ii*) claims against enemy subjects, including of course firms and companies.

4. Dealing first with claims against enemy Governments, these would usually be either:—

- (a) Claims for compensation in respect of property belonging to British subjects which has been requisitioned, confiscated, or sequestered by an enemy Government, or
- (b) Claims for compensation in respect of loss caused by the destruction of life or property on sea or land by acts contrary to the laws of war.

But any other valid claim—such as claims for the price of goods sold to an enemy Government before the war, or claims for pensions or salaries in respect of services rendered—must also be returned. In such cases there must, however, be some valid ground of claim. The mere fact that by reason of the war a British subject has suffered loss does not in itself afford a ground of claim. For example, no claim can be registered for expenses incurred in leaving an enemy country on the outbreak of war, or for loss due to the fact that a British subject cannot trade with the enemy. Claims in respect of public securities issued in enemy countries by enemy Governments, Municipalities or public bodies are only claims against enemy Governments when the enemy Government has proposed to confiscate or sequester them. Otherwise they are claims against the enemy subjects, firms or companies in whose possession they are.

Claims against enemy Governments of the kinds mentioned above are to be sent in to the Custodian of Enemy Property on Registration Form A. attached hereto.

5. The second of the two principal classes of claims as to which returns have to be made, *i.e.*, claims against enemy subjects, including firms and companies, falls also into two main heads:—

- (a) Claims by British subjects in respect of property belonging to them in enemy territories other than property falling under head (b). The form to be used for these returns is Registration Form H. 1 attached hereto.
- (b) Claims by British subjects in respect of debts due them by enemy firms or persons, balances in enemy banks, unpaid interest or dividends accrued since the war or securities. The form for these returns is Registration Form G. 1 attached hereto.

6. As to (a), "Property" is to be taken in its widest sense, and includes for example:—

Securities of enemy Governments, States or Municipalities; enemy industrial or commercial securities of all kinds; securities of any kind held in safe custody for British subjects by enemy firms or banks; land and houses; capital invested in enemy businesses; trade stocks in enemy hands; patents, copyrights and concessions, belonging or granted to British subjects by enemies; cargoes on enemy ships, whether in neutral or enemy waters; cash and personal effects, furniture, etc. As some difficulty may be felt with regard to securities, it should be carefully noted that no matter where the documentary evidence of title may be, the securities should be recorded on Registration Form H. 1 referred to above. If for example a British subject in Uganda has an investment in Prussian Fours, he must make a return even if the securities are in his own possession in Kampala, or in the hands of a bank or broker in London or Berlin. The whereabouts of the securities should be noted on the form.

7. Heading (b) includes certain specific kinds of property—debts, bank balances and accrued interest—which it has been found more convenient to record separately. These specific kinds of property are to be returned on Form G. 1 referred to above. Note, as to this, that interest accrued since the war on e.g. an investment in Prussian Fours must be returned on this form, though the security itself which forms the capital is to be returned on Form H. 1.

8. It must be noted that neither in the case of claims against enemy Governments nor in the case of those against enemy subjects does the fact that a claim is sent in and recorded imply any undertaking on behalf of His Majesty's Government to put forward such claim on the termination of hostilities, or any assurance that the claim, if put forward, will be paid.

9. For the sake of convenience of reference, Forms H. 1 and G. 1 (attached to the Notice of 14th June, 1916) are reprinted in the Schedule hereto following Form A. As the total number of returns from Uganda is likely to be small, it is not proposed to print loose forms, and those liable to make returns must write or type out similar forms to those shewn below and fill them. A mere general letter will not be accepted.

10. Any explanations sought will be furnished by the Custodian of Enemy Property but it must be remembered that the returns must in any case be made within thirty days from this date, and that an imperfect understanding of the obligations imposed by the Ordinance will not absolve from liability to penalties.
